I have had contact with many in the community via phone or email and the stories and actions are very touching. People preparing and delivering meals, calling and touching base with vulnerable people in our Shire, setting up social media pages to support businesses and so much more.

Thanks to the volunteers from The New Woodend Star for continuing with the publication. There has never been a more important time to continue to share news and stories.

Community embraces telehealth

In less than two weeks, Cobaw Community Health has completely altered the way that it delivers its services to ensure the protection of the community from the risk of COVID-19 exposure. As a part of the local healthcare system, Cobaw remains open and committed to providing the same high quality support for the community. As well as continuing to support existing clients and participants, Cobaw welcomes new referrals.

Staff have been delighted at how open people have been to having their appointments over the phone or, with even greater success, via video, and how guickly they have adjusted. This includes services such as physiotherapy, speech pathology and cardiac rehab which are being delivered by telehealth.

All of Cobaw's Primary Health team are providing services by telehealth including the adult and child occupational therapists, paediatrician, pulmonary rehabilitation nurse and the dietician. There are even plans to run the adult exercise groups by video.

"With our children's services appointments, we encourage families to do the video consult on a mobile device so that they can move around the home with the child," says Prue

Southey, Manager Primary Health. "Practitioners are able to work with children in the comfort of their own environment using familiar toys and other household objects to assist with the child's therapy."

"Older adults are particularly isolated at the moment with advice from the Government to the over 70s to remain at home," says Ms Southey. "As with everyone, it is essential to remain physically active and maintain strength and mobility, so keeping up with their appointments maintains both regular social connection and exercise.

Cobaw has closed all of its sites in line with the advice of Victoria's Chief Health Officer, but telephone lines remain open for new referrals, general enquiries and direct contact with a clinician. Appointments in person can also be arranged where necessary, and some staff are continuing to work with clients in their homes, particularly those transitioning out of hospital or needing equipment, or those with communication barriers.

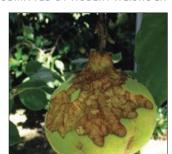

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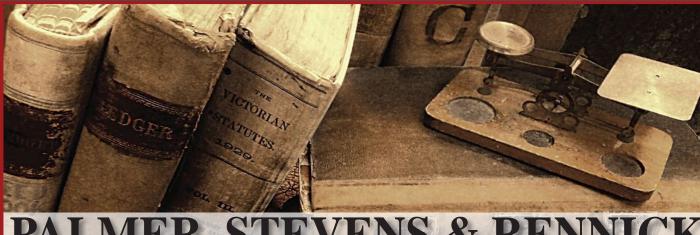


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Community choir goes online

The Cobaw With One Voice Central Victoria choir has recently celebrated one year since its official launch on 27 March 2019. Celebrations weren't typical of this

socially-minded group, as new rules restrict gatherings. The choir has now moved to the online platform Zoom, where the members of the choir can come together at the same weekly time to connect, laugh, and of course, sing!

Conducted by internationally acclaimed singer and musician Gabriel Macura, the With One Voice Central Victoria choir was established with funding from Creativity Australia, the not-for-profit organisation behind the network of 25 With One Voice choirs across Australia.

The choir welcomes anyone who wants to sing, regardless of their experience, and there are no auditions and no requirement to be able to read music. The aim is to promote social connectedness and inclusion and to improve the health and wellbeing of participants through the benefits of singing.

The Zoom choir has proved so successful that they have had two new members join who had found driving to Kyneton for practice difficult in the past, and now are able to access the choir.

"This has allowed us to rethink how we may move forward once we are able to reconvene in the future," said Carly Visscher, Cobaw's Community Connections Manager. "We have been most grateful to the Macedon Ranges Shire Council for its support in allowing us to use the Kyneton Mechanics Institute for rehearsals, but once Cobaw's new building at 1 Caroline Chisholm Drive, Kyneton opens, we will have access to new technology that will enable us to continue to offer online access to the choir."

Singing is said to make people happier, healthier, smarter and more creative, and a recent Swinburne University study showed that 98% of With One Voice choir participants experienced less stress and 66% felt less depressed.

"Connecting with each other, even if it has to be online for the time being, has never been more important," said Carly. "If we can provide a safe space where people can laugh and enjoy the health benefits of singing, then we are doing the best we can in a time where we are more isolated than ever."

Kyneton Health builds upon existing coronavirus screening service with new Respiratory Assessment Clinic

Macedon Ranges locals have rallied behind Kyneton Health to help set up a Respiratory Assessment Clinic in the hospital's old ambulance bay.

The new clinic, which was formally opened on Tuesday 14 April, will strengthen the hospital's response to the coronavirus outbreak, allowing the hospital to continue to safely assess patients who present with risk factors or concerns about the coronavirus.

Central Highlands Rural Health CEO Maree Cuddihy confirmed patients will not need to enter the hospital's main entrance, instead accessing the clinic through a door to the old ambulance bay, where they will be met by staff skilled in the management of the coronavirus:

"At the moment, our trained nurses are receiving 30-40 calls a day, and are testing around 8-10 patients for the coronavirus. Our existing facilities were coping with these numbers, but the new clinic means we are better equipped to deal with the possibility of an increase in the coronavirus, should the worst happen in our region," Ms Cuddihy said.

Ms Cuddihy also praised local businesses for their help setting up the clinic.

"Our local community have been amazing, helping us build three assessment rooms in record time. Dr Robert Power from Campaspe Family Practice got the project off the ground, recruiting Kennedy and Co. to carry out the majority of the building work free of charge, and asking Home Timber and Hardware in Kyneton to donate materials. Kennedy and Co. also helped secure further in-kind support from Macedon Ranges Plumbing, Bryan Law Electrical and Amp-Up Electrical. Flooring Xtra provided heavily discounted flooring. We cannot thank our community supporters enough for everything they've done," Ms Cuddihy said.

The clinic will initially operate Monday to Friday between 1pm and 3.30pm, evolving with the needs of the community. Patients concerned about symptoms associated with the coronavirus can call ahead on 5422 9900 to speak to a nurse, who will be able to give the best advice for each situation. Patients who meet the clinical criteria will be booked in for an appointment for testing.

"As always, anyone who has serious symptoms, such as difficulty breathing, should call 000 immediately and ask for an ambulance," Ms Cuddihy said.

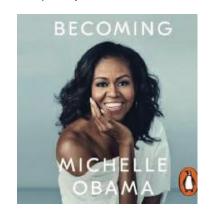
Want to keep up their language skills?

HISTORY OF THE MOUNTVIEW THEATRE, MACEDON

As the stage is currently empty and waiting with great anticipation for the next show to start rehearsing, I thought readers would like to know more about the history of The Mountview Theatre in Macedon.

In 1972, local resident, Neville Thurgood gathered together a group of locals to form The Mount Players, with the intention of entering a one act play in the Kyneton Daffodil Festival. This began what is now a vibrant, active community drawing talent from far and wide. The newly formed theatre company continued to perform one act plays but had no permanent home. In 1975, they obtained a lease for the old Macedon Presbyterian Church, located where the current theatre is today. Between 1975 and 1977, with a grant from the State Ministry for the Arts for \$8,000, members of the company, together with local business groups, donated their time and goods to convert the church into a tiny, cosy theatre with a seating capacity of 50. The theatre officially opened in 1977 with The Golden Legion of Cleaning Women.

Between 1978 and 1982, the company went on to produce a wider range of performances, including murder mysteries, comedies, musicals and pantomimes.

In February 1983, on Ash Wednesday, tragedy struck, when the theatre, along with many members' homes, was destroyed. Original memoirs, photographs and programmes were also lost. So began another period of homelessness, which saw the company perform in venues such as

The Mechanics Hall Gisborne, Wooling Hill in New Gisborne, The Arts Centre in Kyneton, Gisborne Secondary College and The Macedon Family Hotel.

In 1985, the now vacant land was transferred to the ownership of the Shire

of Gisborne and TMP entered into a 21-year lease as tenants of the land and any buildings.

In 1986, and following an intensive period of fundraising, building of the new theatre began. A local professional builder took on the building part time, with members helping with the more mundane jobs to help complete the project.

In 1987, the company was greatly saddened by the sudden loss of their then-

President, Margaret Woods and former secretary and Life Member, Fred Blake.

As work continued, it became clear that there weren't going to be enough funds to complete the theatre, so in 1989, an agreement was entered into with the Shire of Gisborne, whereby the Shire owned the building and The Mount Players were given exclusive occupancy of the theatre and were to manage and

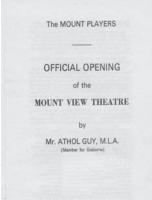
maintain the building from there on.

In November 1990, the new Mountview Theatre officially opened with the performance of Scrooge. The rest, as they say "is history".

The Mount Players have continued to produce four quality productions a year, an annual one-act play festival, and with the introduction of a Youth Theatre in 2007, its future is rosy.

How lucky are we to have this incredible theatre on our doorstep?

All we need now is to clear this virus so we can return to doing what we love the most, bringing live theatre to our audiences.

#InThisTogether – support for residents and businesses

Macedon Ranges Shire Council launches #InThisTogether – a campaign to support residents and businesses during the current coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic.

Chief Executive Officer, Margot Stork said the new financial support measures would take effect immediately and would assist the community, residents, businesses, staff and sporting clubs.

"These are unprecedented times for Council, our community and businesses," Ms Stork said. "We are all in this together, supporting each other at this very challenging time." New support measures by Council include:

- Debt collection activities on 2019/20 unpaid rates and outstanding amounts ceased on 17 March and will remained ceased until 30 September 2020
- Interest will not be charged for overdue rates or other payments through to September 30 2020
- Penalties for late payment of 2020/21 animal registrations due 10 April 2020 will not be applied until 30 September 2020.
- Other existing measures to help residents, businesses, staff and sporting clubs include:
- A process to allow suppliers to request earlier payment than Council's 30-day standard terms to assist cashflow.
 Requests can be made by emailing mrsc@mrsc.vic.gov.au
- Groups which hold facility leases with Council are able to request a waiver of their lease fee/rent as a result of the pandemic impacting their sporting, community and hospitality venue operations.

Ms Stork said COVID-19 was having a far-reaching impact on the community and Council staff and Councillors were committed to supporting the community through this time of uncertainty.

"We have been working on ways to reduce the pressure on our community, businesses and sporting clubs. Please contact us so we can help," Ms Stork said.

"There are a range of options available for those facing financial hardship, and this includes the ability to enable flexible payments and defer payments.

"We know many businesses are facing cash flow challenges. We have the option to pay our suppliers invoices promptly to support the businesses that assist us deliver services to the community.

"We will also review our current budget to redirect funding to assist small business and our community groups in recovery," she said. "This will be an ongoing project – we are in this together, and for as long as necessary."

Playgrounds, skate parks, barbecues and toilets closed

Playgrounds, skate parks, barbecues and some public toilets have been closed as Council continues to respond to the current coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic.

All playgrounds and skate parks in the shire have been cordoned off and signage installed following an Australian Government directive. All barbecues have been turned off and cannot be used.

Council has also reduced the number of public toilets available, with 17 toilets to close. Five toilets will remain open but only the unisex accessible toilet will be available for use.

The remaining 22 public toilets will be cleaned more frequently and will be supplied with soap, paper towels for hand drying and signage detailing recommended hand hygiene.

Council has now closed almost all community facilities to public access, including pools, gyms, libraries, service centres, halls and sports pavilions.

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Flushed rags causing network damage says Western Water

Western Water is reminding customers to only flush the three Ps - pee, poo and (toilet) paper - down the toilet, after experiencing major network issues across the region caused by some residents flushing rags.

At one site, the Western Water network was so badly damaged that two pumps needed replacing.

Over the last few weeks, Western Water has increased its advertising across social media, shopping centres and community papers to remind their customers of what not to flush.

But Western Water's Acting Chief Operating Officer, Paul Clark, said despite the increased advertising there some people flushing unsuitable items down the loo.

"We're grateful for the many people who are doing the right thing, but unfortunately there are still a few who are flushing the wrong items," said Mr Clark.



"Wipes, tissues, paper towels, rags and newspapers should never be flushed down the toilet."

Residents could face expensive plumbing bills if their pipes were to get blocked.

"If you need to use something other than toilet paper, then throw it in the bin instead," Mr Clark said. "If you have already flushed the wrong items, we recommend that you consult a qualified plumber."

Western Water is also appealing to members of the community to share the message amongst their networks where possible, including their parents and friends.

"We all have a role to play in keeping our sewerage network healthy, particularly in these challenging times," said Mr Clark.

"What we flush down the toilet impacts everyone and flushing the wrong items can cause sewer spills in our homes, our neighbourhood or public spaces, like parks".

"We are asking our customers, to please think before you flush. It's vital for the liveability of our region."

Now, more than ever, RM Begg requires community support to assist in our ongoing future.



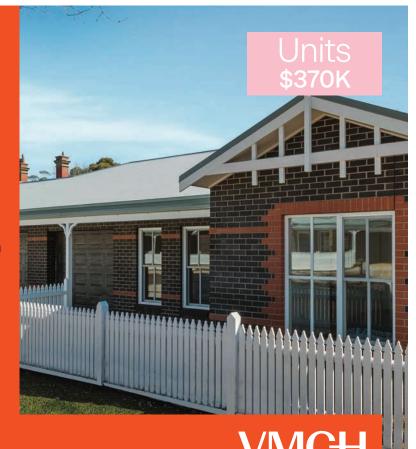

Introduction

It is hard to know exactly what is happening in Macedon Ranges when this article is read in May, however one thing is for sure, the wonderful producers of the Macedon Ranges and surrounds need your support more than ever. We are fortunate to live in a small, tight-knit wine-growing region that has a focus on quality over quantity. Many of the producers rely on both cellar door and sales through restaurants to survive. Almost all have direct sales available, so please do your bit to reach out to your favourite producer, or try something new to support those in our region where

The reviews for this month are two benchmark examples of Pinot Noir from the Macedon Ranges, Curly Flat has long been one of the stars of the region but Matt Harrop joining the team in recent times has lifted it to another level. The two wines reviewed are new to the range at Curly Flat and are small run bottling from different blocks within the estate vineyard in Lancefield.

2018 Curly Flat Western Pinot Noir

A small bottling from the western plantings at Curly Flat, the vines were planted in 1998 and it is the coolest site in the vineyard. The aromatics are quite stunning, with purity of red cherry fruit intertwined with baking spice and warm earthen tones. The palate has power and finesse, with a backbone of finely etched tannin that is drying and mineral but gives the platform for the concentrated red berry fruits to slowly unfurl. Oak gives generosity and a thread of continuity to the wine, with the finish giving layers of cherry and rhubarb fruit that lingers. A wine that is showing incredibly well now, and will continue to grow in the decade to come.

2018 Curly Flat Central Pinot Noir

This wine was made from fruit sourced from the oldest plantings at Curly Flat that were planted in 1992; the wine makes a fascinating comparison to the 'Western' Pinot Noir and gives insights into the final assemblage of the Estate Pinot. The Central is a more masculine representation of Pinot Noir in terms of tannin and structure, but still maintains floral aromatics that showcase pristine cool climate fruit and the deft use of new French oak. The nose focuses on dark cherry and rhubarb fruit with lifted oakinduced aromatics. There is a completeness to the wine on the palate, with a generosity of fruit that sits alongside supple but impactful tannins; it is the tannin profile that sets the wine apart; they come in layers and envelop expressive dark cherry fruit and live long beyond the final sip.

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Holgate is still open and keeping it local

Like many hospitality businesses around Australia, Holgate Brewhouse in Woodend have made a swift shift of their business to keep bringing the best of Holgate to their local community and beyond; launching an online shop, turning their new taproom into a full-time bottleshop, and doing takeaway meals (and beers) on weekends.

Natasha Holgate explains, "Paul and I have been part of the Woodend community since 1992, operating our business for over 20 years," and while this is a new challenge, it is one they have thrown themselves into with gusto, and with the incredible support of their team who are still brewing beers, cooking food, running the bottleshop and delivering a steady stream of online orders.

While COVID-19 has seen pubs and restaurants close their doors, the current situation has also forced many to be quick on their toes - and Holgate is no exception. They launched an online shop (holgateshop.com) in a couple of days which now sells their full range of beer to the local community, Melbourne and interstate destinations. They are even doing free delivery to the Macedon region for orders over \$50, and free delivery to the Daylesford region and Ballarat for orders over \$75. Many of these orders are being hand delivered by Holgate's hard working staff - in some cases by the head brewer himself!

Online shoppers can also enjoy a new range of mixed cases of 24 beers with appropriately Woodend-style names like the 'Mountain Essentials' and 'Into the Woods' packs. So, people can sample more of Holgate's extensive range of craft beers delivered to their door.

In addition to their online shop, Holgate are also operating their Taproom (which opened just last November as a Taproom & Visitor Centre) as a full-time bottleshop selling the full Holgate range to take away, plus wine and gin from fellow local producers. They're even selling hand sanitiser produced by local gin distillers Big Tree.

The kitchen is also open on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights from 5 - 8.30pm for takeaway pub grub. With a menu of pub classics, including free-range chicken parma, Cape Grim beef burger, and fish and chips (for \$15), locals can now get their weekend pub feed at home - including throwing in a 6 pack of Holgate beers for just \$20. Delivery is free to Woodend for orders over \$50, and just \$10 to Kyneton, Macedon or Gisborne. Customers can order online (holgatebrewhouse. com) during the kitchen's opening hours.

Plus, they've got a load of new products for people to enjoy at home, including their recently launched Road Trip cans, Apple Berry Beer, and brand new limited release 2020 Millennium Falcon Emperial IPA.

Natasha says, "We are so pleased that we can continue to provide food and beer during this difficult time." The next few months will be a challenge for your favourite local businesses. There has never been a more important time to support them.

Woodend Kinder's new outdoor play space complete

Children at Woodend Kindergarten are now enjoying their brand new inclusive outdoor learning space, as Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas, announced in April that the construction upgrade is now complete. "As a Pick My Project winner, it's clear that this upgrade of the Woodend Kindergarten means so much to many in our community," Ms Thomas said.

The project was made possible through a \$198,000 funding boost from the state government's Pick My Project initiative, an online community grants program that gave members of the community a chance to suggest project ideas and then vote to decide which ones were funded.

The Kindergarten also received \$152,000 from the government's Children's Facilities Capital Program and \$120,000 from Macedon Ranges Shire Council, and made their own \$5,000 contribution.

Though three-year-old kindergarten classes are currently suspended at the kindergarten due to COVID-19, four-year-olds who are attending the service have been able to use their new play area.

Woodend Kindergarten also received \$6,193 as part of the Inclusive Kindergarten Funding program, which has been used to purchase a range of sensory equipment, ensuring all children attending the kinder can participate in a range of activities.

The upgrade is part of a plan to ensure every Victorian child has access to at least five hours of subsidised three-year-old kinder by 2022, progressively scaled up to 15 hours per week over the next decade, which will be the largest social, economic and educational reform ever undertaken in early childhood learning in Victoria's history.

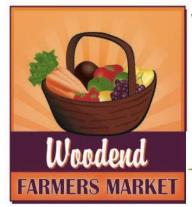

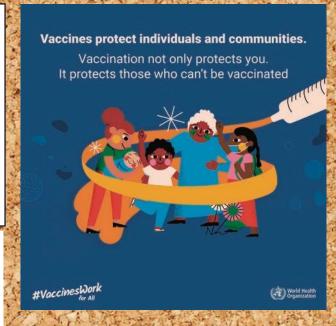
Woodend Community Farmers' Markets during COVID-19

Food markets are deemed essential services by both the federal and Victorian state governments. The Macedon Ranges Sustainability Group (MRSG), which runs the Woodend Community Farmers' Market, also recognises the essential nature of accredited farmers' markets in ensuring local food security. Many families in the Macedon Ranges depend on these markets for their livelihood. In the interests of supporting local food producers and enabling residents to buy food during this critical time, the Woodend Community Farmers' Market will continue throughout the COVID-19 crisis. The market will be held on the first Saturday of each month, 9am to 1pm, at the corner of High and Forest Streets, Woodend, albeit in a drastically changed format and recognising that advice from government authorities may change.

As a response to the crisis, the market will only offer essentials such as fruit, vegetables, fish, bread, coffee beans, honey, wine, dairy and meat. Customers are requested not to stay longer than necessary. For that reason, there will be no produce swap stall, music, face-painting, seating arrangements, or hot food for sale at the market. All transactions are to be done by debit or credit card. MRSG volunteers will be controlling patronage levels and reducing stall density to comply with social distancing restrictions. Stallholders have been instructed not to sell to customers prior to 9am so please do not come early. Check the farmers' market status page at mrsg.org.au/farmersmarket-status for customer instructions.

If you are unwell or have been around someone who is unwell, please don't come to the market. Otherwise please do support our producers. The Woodend Community Farmers' Market will be held on the 1st Saturday of the month.

However, there are still nearly 20 million unvaccinated and under-vaccinated children in the world today.

World Immunisation Week was held at the end of last month, and this year's theme was — #VaccinesWork For All — emphasising the benefits of vaccines for individuals, their communities, and everyone around the world. It is also an opportunity to highlight how vaccines and the people who develop, deliver and receive them are champions working to protect the health of everyone, everywhere.

At the Neighbourhood House, we are committed to helping people do this, so we stay in contact and connected with the people in our community, even though we can't gather together.

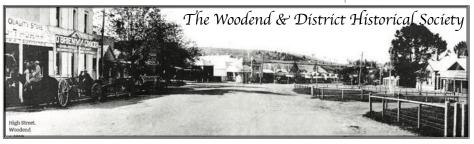
Woodend Neighbourhood House has had to cease all face to face contact and close our physical doors to our House users and community members. So instead, we are;

THE WORKING HORSE

In the Macedon Ranges, in the age of the working horse, the Bowyer family were just one of many who bred their own Clydesdales. Bill was the youngest son of Francis Bowyer and Beatrice Tully and he farmed with his father for many years, using horses until 1954, when they brought their first tractor. They cultivated oats, wheat and potatoes

Clydesdales were popular because they usually had black hooves which did not break as easily as white hooves. Some people had their Clydesdales shod, particularly if they had to walk and stand on roads, but many never needed to. Clydesdales generally had a quiet nature and would learn to do their work without always being guided. Many farmers formed a very close bond with their horses.

As well as agriculture, Clydesdales were used for pulling logs at sawmills, making roads and weirs, and pulling any heavy load. On farms, some horses worked nearly all year, preparing paddocks, pulling drills to sow seeds, harrowing, harvesting oats and other feed for animals, or pulling stones or logs. Potatoes were the main crop grown for people.

The breed originated in Scotland. Possibly the colony's first champion stallion came to Newham from Tasmania with William Peters of the pioneering Peters family, who became well known for their fine draught horses. From the 1850s, breeding became common, and in lovely weather on 10 November in 1858, the Kyneton Agricultural Society held its first livestock show and included draught horse stallions, or 'entires'. The show was such a huge success that the Society held one the following year just for Clydesdales, and it became a regular event for many years.

Cooking, heating, and electrical equipment are among the leading causes of home fires each year. As people continue to stay at home and engage in these activities, it's critical that they recognise where potential hazards exist and what can be done to prevent them. Take the CFA home safety quiz.

Answer these twenty questions.

- 1. Is there a smoke alarm in your home? Do you test it every month?
- 2. Do you replace the battery annually, or when the low battery alarm activates?
- 3. Is your house number easy to see so emergency vehicles can find you?
- 4. Have you placed the emergency phone number beside all your phones?
- 5. Has your household made and practised a home fire escape plan?
- 6. Have you planned a safe meeting place outside?
- 7. Do you have a fire extinguisher in your home?
- 8. Is your home protected by an electrical safety switch?
- 9. Are the keys kept in or near exits with deadlocks?
- 10. Do you always have electrical repairs, alterations or renovations done by a qualified electrician?
- 11. Do you avoid overloading power points?
- 12. Are flammable liquids stored away from heaters, hot water service pilot lights and other naked flames?
- 13. Do you avoid pouring flammable liquids in high risk areas such as refuelling a lawn mower near a hot water service?
- 14. Is your electric blanket switched off before you get into bed?
- 15. Do you always use a fire screen with an open fire?
- 16. Are heating appliances kept safely away from laundry, curt ains and furniture?
- 17. Are matches and cigarette lighters kept out of the way of children?
- 18. Do you clean the lint filter of your clothes dryer after each load?
- 19. Does everyone know the cold water first aid treatment for burns?
- 20. Is there clear access for CFA trucks to get close to your house at least 4 metres wide x 4 metres high?

How did you score?

Every YES scores a point!

Less than 10 – The potential for fire in your household is dangerously high. You need to be more than fire aware. 10 to 15 – Not bad. But there are still several things you can do to decrease the likelihood of a fire. 16 to 20 – Well done! You are giving yourself the best chance of protecting your life and property from house fire.

Residents urged to take care burning off

Now that fire restrictions have been lifted CFA has urged residents in the state's North West to take extreme care when burning off.

CFA Commander Chris Jacobsen would like to remind residents to register their burn-off and check the local conditions on the day. "Even if you have registered your burn, conditions can change quickly and fires can get out of control within minutes in dry and windy conditions."

"The effects of an out-of-control fire can be devastating, and we want everyone to exercise extreme caution. However, if the fire is not an emergency, we ask the public to instead of ringing triple zero, please call the Burn Off Notification Line instead, on 1800 668 511" he commented.

A reminder that "it's the resident's responsibility to ensure that a burn off does not get out of control. If this does happen, you should dial '000' immediately. People should have a fire plan and prepare for the event of fire, and never become complacent."

If you light the fire, then ultimately you are solely responsible until it is completely extinguished!

Keep your burn-off safe and legal:

- Check whether bylaws apply with your local council or if fire restrictions are in force;
- Register your burn on 1800 668 511;
- Check and monitor weather conditions particularly wind;
- To avoid unnecessary calls to emergency services, notify your neighbours beforehand;
- Leave a three metre fire break, free from flammable materials around the burn;
- Have sufficient equipment and water to stop the fire spreading;
- Never leave a burn-off unattended stay for its entire duration;
- If your burn-off gets out of control, call '000' immediately;

Practical tips for Parents & Students

This is a difficult time for all and it is normal that your children may be feeling anxious or worried.

As students, the following tips will assist in your learning development:

- Establish a routine for your learning.
- Check your school's website/portal and emails regularly for tasks to complete.
- If you are having technical issues, contact your school IT department as soon as possible.
- Most importantly, look out for each other. Message or video contact each other. Ask friends how they are coping with studies or isolation. Remind them that you care, you're listening and that you're available if they're feeling worried.

Instructions for Year 12 students

Although isolation is a unique challenge, there are opportunities for all students to succeed. Continue your studies under instruction from your teacher and contact them asap if you have any concerns or questions. Regular contact with teachers



and school is fundamental to your mental wellbeing and educational success.

Information for Parents

Parents don't need to take on the role of their child's teacher, but to help them establish good routines and monitor their mental and physical health. Physical and mental wellbeing is extremely important throughout this challenging time. Daily routines and normality will help alleviate stress.

- If you can, set up a dedicated workspace for the students away from distractions (a public space is better than a bedroom so that you can check in with their learning regularly).
- Ensure that the student/s understands they need to be appropriately dressed and aware of what is in the background of their computer camera.
- Begin and end each day by asking about your child's learning but remember it is not your job to teach them.
- Monitor communications from your child's teachers.
- Keep your children social, but set rules around their social media interactions. Continue to monitor how much time your child is spending online.
- Remember that your child might be stressed or worried during this time.
- Talk to your whole family about the infection, understanding the situation will reduce anxiety.
- Help your children to think about how they have coped with difficult situations in the past and reassuring them that they will cope with this situation too.
- Remind them that the isolation won't last for long.
- Exercise regularly exercise is a proven treatment for stress and depression.
- Encourage your children to keep in touch with family members and friends.
